NOTTON PARISH COUNCIL

The Council continues to tick over during the present crisis period. We have not been able to hold any meetings, or do the litter-pick, but the grass continues to get cut, bills are being paid, and we were able to arrange a list of helpers for deliveries etc for people who were self-isolating. Other than that most activities and events have been cancelled. We hope to arrange Annual Meeting of the Council when face-to-face meetings are eventually permitted by the Government.

Wakefield Council's abandonment of the green waste and bulky rubbish collections have, as expected, led to an increase in fly-tipping in the Parish. Collections should restart on 10th June. The Household waste sites are now open. You can report fly-tipping to Wakefield Council on 0345 8 506 506 or http://www.wakefield.gov.uk/anti-socialbehaviour/dropped-litter/ Unfortunately we were informed too late of the Facebook PACT meeting arranged by WestYorkshire Police for 12 th May for the Wakefield Rural area. However more are scheduled - 24 th of June, via www.facebook.com/WYPWakefieldNER/. If anyone has any concerns to bring to the attention of the Police then contact them using this website. Remember, if you want ideas for a local walk, the Walk Maps are still available in the Shop. However, a consequence of more people out walking dogs has been an increase in the quantity of dog poo left on footpaths, the Green, the cricket field and other areas where people, especially young children, have access. This is totally unacceptable. We would ask that anyone who sees dog poo in the act of being left un-picked-up reports the offence, preferably with a name and photographs, to the Parish Council or the Police (101) or best of all to WMDC at http://www.wakefield.gov.uk/anti-social-behaviour/dogs/report-dogfouling/ If there is sufficient evidence they can be fined up to £1000..

The road safety scheme at Notton Crossroads is half done: we are waiting for the red road markings to be laid. The recent collision at the chicane at the western end of the village has been reported to WMDC Highways in the hope that they will at least provide better warning of the Give Way system to traffic from the A61.

Cllr Jaggar has been putting up our Smiley Sid at various places in the parish: the data collected shows that the only area where traffic speeds are anywhere near the posted limit on is George Lane by the Green: even here many vehicles were travelling at between 30 and 40 mph.

Please be mindful of your neighbours if you have a party outside, or a garden bonfire (which should be limited to night-time only).

NOTTON CRICKET CLUB

Cricket & Covid-19: Eyes Forward

As we start to emerge from spring and creep ever closer to summer with our cricket club yet to see the toss of a coin, it would be easy to feel negative about 2020 so far and question the likelihood of seeing competitive cricket enjoyed on the wicket in the coming months.

But as a club, and a village, it's in our nature to focus on the positives of which there are many.

As I write this we would have been preparing for week 7 of our fixtures and looking forward to a 1^{st} X1 trip to Horbury Bridge and our 2nd X1 would have been welcoming Calder Grove CC for a home fixture.

Instead, we're looking forward to our second one-to-one socially-distanced practice session on Saturday, making use of our brand new training wicket which will help to develop players of all ages both now and in the years to come.

These sessions have taken a lot of planning and adherence to the method put in place in the professional game to ensure that safety is put above anything else, and whilst it's far from what we're used to, there is a comfort in hearing the sound of leather on willow in Notton once again.

Many will have noticed that the new wicket isn't the only improvement we've made whilst we have the privilege of time. The installation of 4 benches on the boundary edge (with a grant from the Parish Council) will hopefully welcome residents, friends, family and fans to the ground when cricket eventually returns.

On top of this, after the winter floods and a dry spring, we've completed repairs to ensure the pitch is perfect for our next home fixture, which is provisionally scheduled for 4^{tth} July but subject to further guidance from the government and ECB.

Whilst we're focussing on these positives and continuing to look forward to something like normality, its important to be realistic and acknowledge the impact that Covid-19 is having on the finances of our club.

The above improvements have been the result of grants from the national lottery and government flood repair grant, as well as the generosity of the Village Hall Committee and a grant from Notton Parish Council for the boundary benches.

The club's own fundraising avenues however have been almost entirely removed for the year we're potentially seeing a loss of around $\pounds 6,000 - \pounds 7,000$, this is not only due to missing match-fees but also the cancellation of car boot sales (which WMDC have asked us to cancel until further notice) and possibly the Classic Car Show (which is currently scheduled for Sunday 28th June but subject to Government ruling at that time.) With this in mind, any support would be much appreciated and we're keen to discuss future sponsorship opportunities as well as welcoming any donations with open arms. This is a very exciting time for our club as we continue to improve both on the pitch and off. A community grant has been awarded to fund youth coaching and our new practice

wicket, we're leading the way in our plans for walking cricket for the retired and over-55s, the club is welcoming new and returning players each season, we've become famous for our beautiful setting and fantastic pitch (even sparking the interest of ex-England and Yorkshire all-rounder Craig White who recent paid us a visit) and we're looking forward to the same success on the pitch.

Covid-19 is certainly a hurdle to us as a club, but we will get over it and continue to move forward and enjoy our sport. What's more important right now is that we stay safe and make sure the club is fit and ready to return to the field when we see the green light. We'd like to send our best wishes to all residents at this time and look forward to welcoming you back to the ground when the time is right. Stay safe,

NOTTON VILLAGE HALL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Because of the coronavirus all village hall functions ceased on the 15^{th} March until further notice. Besides not being able to carry out our usual Fund Raising and entertainment events such as Gala, VE day celebration, and others we have also lost all the revenue from hires of the Hall and Sports Pavilion. On the positive side we applied for a business grant from Wakefield Council to help with the loss of earnings and we were successful and received a grant for £10,000. We also received a Business Rates rebate of £900. This money will go a long way to maintain our hall for the year and compensate for our loss of earnings. We have during the shutdown managed to have quite a lot of maintenance and improvements carried out to the hall such as the reroofing of the rear store which had quite a few leaks. We have also changed the barrier to the field with a gate making it a lot easier to open and close for ease of access, and surfaced the track down to the pavilion. We have put some heating in the new Sports Pavilion. We are also in the progress of installing *CC*TV the village hall car oark to help with security.

Regarding the cleaning of the village hall, we decided to keep the cleaner employed during shutdown and she has given the hall a much needed deep clean.

During the last few weeks, we have had 4 or 5 members of the village (keeping social distance) carrying out the clearing of brambles and tree branches around the sports field and down the Ings. This has made a huge difference and opened up the area to make it more accessible for people to visit. We have saved around 20 young trees which were planted some 8 years ago which were totally covered with brambles. We have made a path down through the Ings and opened a wildlife pond. All this work has made a huge difference to the sports fields and Ings and it is intended to set up a group to keep it maintained on a regular basis.

With regard to future events like the flower show and bonfire in the hall and grounds, we are not sure if these will take place but hopefully we will try to get back to some form of normality in the not too distant future. We strongly adhere to Government Guidelines and follow them in the interest of us all.
